Drive Safely - Peep & Creep

Within the village there are many blind entrances and a blind T-Junction. The recommended practice to emerge safely in these situations is to Peep and Creep, moving forward slowly to improve your view and keep looking both ways for updates on oncoming vehicles. To assist drivers and pedestrians at the Porritt Lane & Green Island junction, two convex mirrors have been installed on Porritt Lane across from Green Island, providing additional visibility for oncoming traffic on Porritt Lane.

Did You Know




